VOLTAIRE AND THE FRENCH ENLIGHTENMENT **October 5 - 6, 2007**

Prolific author, philosopher, social reformer, and successful businessman, Voltaire was a leading figure of the French Enlightenment as well as an advisor to some of the most important monarchs of Europe: Frederick the Great of Prussia and Catherine the Great of Russia. A fierce critic of the Church, religion, and aristocratic privilege, he offended many powerful interests, but also helped lay the foundations of a modern society based on the rule of law and reason.

Friday, October 5, 8:00 pm - 10:15 pm

Keith Baker, the J.E. Wallace Sterling Professor in Humanities and the Jean-Paul Gimon Director of the France-Stanford Center of Stanford University, will discuss the ideas of several prominent contributors to the French Enlightenment. **Maria Cheremeteff**, Head of the Art History Department at City College of San Francisco and Lecturer at both the De Young and Legion of Honor Museums in San Francisco, will follow with an illustrated lecture on the art of the Enlightenment.

Saturday, October 6, 10:00 am – 4:00 pm

David Bodanis, award-winning author and lecturer at Oxford University, will discuss his book *Passionate Minds*. This is the fascinating account of Voltaire, his mistress Émilie du Châtelet, who was a brilliant scientist in her own right, and their joint intellectual projects. **Roger Hahn**, emeritus professor at UC Berkeley, will discuss the ideas and influence of this author and philosopher. **David Morris**, acclaimed cellist and violist will perform the works of Rameau on viola de gamba, along with **David Wilson** on violin and **Katherine Heater** on the harpsichord. **Kip Cranna**, Musical Administrator of the San Francisco Opera, will give a presentation on the composers of the Enlightenment. Moderator **Roger Hahn** will lead a panel discussion at the end of the program.
